The other test point is 160 kg

single shift means the chair is rated for single shift (SS) duty 5 days a week, 8 hours a day. Multi-shift (MS) rating means it's suitable for use 24/7

These are special chairs for special purposes. The Rated Load concept is a response to the gradual increase in human sizing over the past three to four decades, and as a result of the obesity crisis. It also meets demands by consumers and clients for certified extreme duty chairs.

Chairs certified at this level are not required for people of 'normal' body mass i.e. up to 110 kg. Accordingly, AFRDI is continuing to test and certify chairs under its long-established Blue Tick product certification scheme.
